n February 27, 1942, the first elements of the 27th ID, now 22,000 strong, sailed from San Francisco on an 11 day trip to Hawaii. After landing at Hilo, Hawaii on March 10, the division's infantry regiments dispersed to their assigned duties--the 165th Infantry Regiment Combat Team (IRCT) to Kauai Military District: the 108th IRCT to Maui; 105th IRCT to defend New York State Military Museum the Ewa Plain, next to Pearl

Diamond Head and Pearl Harbor. In August, the 27th ID was reduced from four to three infantry regiments with the 108th Infantry, and a battalion of the 104th Field Artillery reassigned to the

> 40th Division in late August 1942. When off duty, soldiers of the 27th ID unwound by relaxing on the gorgeous beaches, deep sea fishing, going to USO shows, attending Sunday religious services, playing sports, and participating in local events. Lei Day, May 1st, a traditional holiday to celebrate the culture and heritage of the Hawaiian people,

was celebrated with US military personnel stationed in Hawaii. Events included elaborate hula dances and hand concerts.
